Chancellor Mehdizadeh was nominated by members of the 4CD Classified Senate Coordinating Council (CSCC) for her exceptional support of the involvement of classified professionals in participatory governance at the local, district, and state levels. ## **4CD Celebrates Pride** Month

At their meeting on June 11, the 4CD Governing Board adopted a resolution recognizing June as LGBTQIA+ Pride Month. This resolution reaffirms 4CD's commitment to fostering an inclusive, affirming, and safe environment for LGBTQIA+ students, employees, and community members by actively promoting equity, dignity, and belonging, and by denouncing and addressing all forms of anti-LGBTQIA+ discrimination, harassment, and hate speech.

Each June, 4CD celebrates Pride Month, which honors the 1969 Stonewall riots in New York City, that served as a catalyst



for the LGBTQIA+ rights movement. The month-long celebration recognizes the influence that LGBTQIA+ individuals have had on history, culture, and society, and acknowledges the ongoing struggles for equal rights and acceptance.

Flag raising ceremonies were held on each campus to mark the occasion, and Pride Month events reflecting the diversity and spirit of their campus communities were held across 4CD.

At CCC, the LGBTQIA+ Advisory Group and Rainbow Comets Club led a robust lineup of events in the weeks leading up to June. Their Pride programming included an LGBTQIA+ Summit, a "Know Your Rights" information session, and a Pride Picnic, all aimed at empowering students and fostering awareness and allyship.

On June 17, at Diablo Valley College's (DVC) Pleasant Hill Campus, the Inclusivity & Wellness Center welcomed students and staff to a special screening of "But I'm a Cheerleader," a LGBTQIA+ romantic comedy-drama. Continuing the celebration, the Pleasant Hill Campus Library hosted a children's Pride story time complete with story readings, snacks, and fun activities for young attendees.

Los Medanos College (LMC) celebrated Pride at its Pittsburg and Brentwood campuses through community-building events. The Puente program led a Pride Plática, encouraging conversations among friends, allies, and LGBTQIA+ students. Additional festivities included a Pride Kickoff Gathering, a lively Pride Karaoke session that gave students an opportunity to celebrate through music and community, and "Free Mom Hugs."

These events reflect 4CD's shared values and its dedication to celebrating and uplifting the LGBTQIA+ community, not just in June, but year-round.





## **Campuses Host Juneteenth Celebrations**

In 2021, Juneteenth became a federal holiday, commemorating the emancipation of enslaved African Americans. Juneteenth is the oldest national celebration of the end of slavery, observed since the late 1800s.

Celebrating freedom and serving as a reminder of the ongoing fight against racism, June 19 marks Juneteenth, the day in 1865 when enslaved African Americans in Galveston, Texas, were informed of their freedom, two and a half years after the Emancipation Proclamation. Traditionally, Juneteenth includes activities focused on education, self-improvement, and community, such as guest speakers, elder stories, and prayer services.

This year, Contra Costa County hosted a wide range of Juneteenth celebrations that honored the legacy of Black freedom, resilience, and community. 4CD colleges were proud to take part throughout the week.

CCC joined the City of Richmond's Juneteenth Parade and Festival at Nicholl Park, with Dean Dr. **George Mills** and Outreach Program Manager **Joel Nickelson-Shanks** representing CCC and engaging with the local community.

DVC helped kick off the 4th Annual Juneteenth Freedom Ride on June 20, serving as the starting point for a symbolic motorcycle and classic car ride honoring Black history. DVC also hosted its own on-campus celebration, complete with lunch, performances, and a Juneteenth exhibit and prizes.

At the City of Pittsburg/Souljahs Juneteenth Celebration, LMC connected with the community at an outreach table. LMC hosted Juneteenth barbecues at both the Brentwood Center and Pittsburg Campus, bringing together students, staff, and community members for food, games, and reflection. On June 19, 4CD was closed in observance of the holiday, while LMC staff showed their continued support by tabling at city celebrations in Antioch and Brentwood.









## **4CD Recognizes Faculty Internship Graduates**

This spring, 4CD celebrated the graduation of its first Teaching Excellence Faculty Internship (4CD TEFI) program, which provided opportunities for qualified individuals who are interested in pursuing a teaching career at a California community college in Science, Technology, Engineering, and Mathematics (STEM). This paid internship opportunity, held during the 2024-2025 academic year, consisted of Saturday workshops throughout the fall, which were conducted by faculty leads focused on teaching strategies incorporating principals of diversity, equity, and inclusion. During the spring 2025 semester, interns were paired with a faculty mentor to co-teach and shadow in an actual class section.



ACD Director of Human Resources **Dan Cueva** shared, "this has been a successful program; nearly all our interns have been offered part-time or full-time faculty positions. The fall workshops, coupled with the spring classroom experience, have adequately prepared our interns to serve as community college instructors to teach and inspire our diverse student population."
